She has been with Neighbour Aid since 2014 and has used our Garden Aid service and attended Outings.

Joyce has experienced many changes in her life and the world around her, but she admits "the biggest change has been in me". After several recent hospital stays due to falls, Joyce has learnt resilience and how to navigate life's challenges. Despite these setbacks, she is proud of the life she has built, working at Berlei and making bras for the nurses in the American Army, living through and marrying during the war, adopting a son and then having her own son, and of course, working hard to own her home in the inner west.

One of Joyce's most cherished moments was her 100th birthday celebration. Joyce said "I had a lovely party in the garden. They turned it out like Paris. People I knew came, it was very nice."

For the past decade, Inner West Neighbour Aid has been a constant source of joy and connection in Joyce's life. "I used to go on outings, and my son Wayne was part of the Saturday Social Group, which brought us even closer. The laughter, the Christmas parties, and the friendships I've formed over the years have meant a lot. One day, I made my gardener, Stuart, a tuna salad (he doesn't eat meat), but when I leant on the table, it fell right into his lap!" These little moments of humour and connection have kept Joyce going, making every day a little brighter.

What's Joyce's secret to reaching 100?

"No secrets. When I was in rehab doing exercises, people would stop and ask me, are you really 100?" Joyce would tell them, with a sparkle in her eye, "You could say I've been around."



Our Programs

Around the Home

Assisted Online Shopping: A temporary or ongoing fortnightly service for clients who find it difficult to get out to the supermarket. The order is discussed confidentially over the phone, placed online with the preferred supplier, so that orders can be delivered directly to clients.

Dog Walking: We match clients with a passionate volunteer dog walker who take them for an extra walk each week. Many clients and dog walkers bond over their mutual love of pets.

Pet Adoption: We partner with the RSPCA to help clients find the right dog or cat to match their needs. Pets bring unconditional love and in return receive a new home life.

Gardening: For clients who have gardens that need attention and receive limited support. Our qualified staff members work with clients to plan a garden they will enjoy and lead a team of volunteers to help restore gardens so they are safe, easy to maintain and look great. This includes weeding, trimming, pruning, laying mulch and clean up.

Subsidised Lawn Mowing: Working with approved contractors, we help maintain the external beauty of client's homes with our subsidised lawn mowing program.

Help at Home: Help at Home is a private program of Inner West Neighbour Aid, it is not government funded and proceeds from Help at Home support other programs at Inner West Neighbour Aid. We provide services around the home including gardening, lawn mowing, landscaping, high pressure cleaning, window cleaning and cleaning light fittings, assembly of flat pack furniture, minor home maintenance.







After, Garden Aid

Out and about

Outings: A great way to meet new friends and explore Sydney during the week. Outings include concerts, movies, cultural experiences, new cafes, garden spaces, galleries, fish and chips by the sea, exhibitions, tours, clubs and more.

Strong Together: Mainly a centre-based program that includes light exercise, lunch and afternoon activities, including bingo, puzzles and brain teasers, health and wellbeing guest speakers, art and craft and story-telling. This group also includes a monthly outing.

Health and wellbeing

Alive & Kicking: Seniors form friendships, stay independent and mobile by exercising their mind and body at our weekly program including: gentle exercise with a qualified dance and movement instructor, art, trivia, brain training games and healthy ageing guest speakers.

DanceMoves: A weekly seated or standing dance class that focuses on self-expression and movement through dance. A qualified dance instructor demonstrates inclusive guided movements so that seniors can explore their creativity, coordination, fitness and flexibility as well as sharpen their mind and memory.

Stand Tall: This balance and strength program supports seniors to have a go, build their strength and confidence, reduce the likelihood of falls and meet new people. Delivered weekly by personal trainers at a local mainstream gym, sessions are safe and tailored to individual's needs.

5 Senses Garden Workshops: Inclusive weekly workshops focusing on health and wellbeing, creativity, cultural celebrations, food, nature and sustainability. These workshops are a great way to stay connected to the community and to continue to develop skills in a welcoming environment.

Living Well with Dementia Workshops: These therapeutic workshops are tailored for people living with dementia and their carers. The workshops are held twice a month and based around meditation, horticulture, music, art and dance in the beautiful surrounds of our 5 Senses Garden with qualitied facilitators.

Visiting

Home Visiting: Clients are carefully matched with a volunteer according to interests, experiences and outlook on life. Fortnightly visits are relaxed and informal with strong, lasting friendships formed.

Intergenerational Programs

Alive & Kicking: Students from Rivendell School visit the Alive & Kicking program once a month. Student volunteers and seniors are encouraged to connect and engage over activities and interests.

Trolley Talk: Students from Ashfield Boys High School are paired with clients who are independent but require physical help with their grocery shopping. Students may help with reading labels or lifting heavy items or remembering the location of items within the supermarket. This program takes place twice a month at Ashfield Mall. Stories are shared and students and seniors make a difference in each other's lives.

5 Senses Garden Working Bee: Students and teachers from Rivendell School participate in a monthly working bee at the 5 Senses Garden led by a qualified staff member. The 5 Senses Garden is transformed and students walk away with knowledge and an increased appreciation of the benefits of garden therapy.

Macquarie University, Professional and Community Engagement (PACE) Program:

This program matches 3rd year Psychological Science students (undergraduate) to a workplace that is aligned with their course. Students must complete 32 hours in one semester and Neighbour Aid has been involved with this program for over 12 years. This is regarded as an intergenerational connection for our clients as well as a great way to show case Neighbour Aid's programs, volunteer roles and organisational culture to a group of young people who are about to embark on their careers.

Seeds to Trees: Pre-schoolers from Concord West Rhodes Preschool join seniors at the 5 Senses Garden Workshops for art and craft activities, story-telling and music time. An opportunity for children and seniors to connect, learn and work together in a shared space.

Daniel, Building Bonds

Daniel, one of the student volunteers from Rivendell School, started with our Alive & Kicking program in April 2023. He has displayed compassion and dedication, and shown maturity by balancing his study and volunteer commitments. We asked Daniel about his volunteer experience and the importance of intergenerational connections.

"When I first heard about this program, I was drawn to the idea of making someone's day a little brighter. The thought of connecting with someone I wouldn't normally cross paths with felt special. It's always been important to me that older people stay active and engaged, and I wanted to be part of something that made that happen. Especially since I've faced my own challenges with mental health, I saw this as an opportunity to help others overcome their barriers, even if they weren't exactly the same as mine.

What I've enjoyed most is the connection that forms while doing activities together. There's something about crafting or working on a project that makes conversation flow naturally. You're not putting all the pressure on the words, you have the shared task in front of you, and that takes the pressure off. It makes the whole experience more relaxed and enjoyable. Plus, the people I've met are incredibly quick-witted and fun, always making me laugh.

I've noticed that when other student volunteers first come to the program, they're often a bit nervous. But after the session, everyone leaves saying how much fun they had. It's rewarding to hear from other students and volunteers too, knowing that they're getting just as much out of it as the clients.

The program is simple at its core, but the connections it builds are powerful, not just for the people we serve, but for us as volunteers too.

Concord West Rhodes Preschool, Breaking Barriers and Building Bonds

Inner West Neighbour Aid partners with Concord West Rhodes Preschool at the 5 Senses Garden Workshops - bringing together 2 community organisations, who have a joint commitment to ensuring seniors and youngsters not only have intergenerational connections but authentic, meaningful interactions.

"Children and seniors are often overlooked in the fast-paced flow of community life, making them feel marginalized in environments that don't always cater to their specific needs. Bringing them together creates a space where they can build connections, support one another, and feel valued. For children, interacting with seniors helps them gain confidence, while the seniors enjoy watching the children's growth and energy. This interaction creates bonds that bring smiles, laughter, and a deepening sense of connection, helping both groups feel more integrated and appreciated.

The preschoolers thrive in this program, eagerly participating in activities that allow them to share their knowledge and creativity. They form connections through gardening, storytelling, and artistic expressions, which instills a strong sense of identity and community involvement. Gifts are exchanged, from crocheted items made by seniors to painted rocks and handmade books from the children, fostering a mutual appreciation and respect. These interactions not only provide joy but also give the children an opportunity to see themselves as active, contributing members of the community.

What makes this program special is the genuine friendships that form in familiar, inclusive spaces like the 5 Senses Garden. The activities, whether it's gardening, sharing stories, or even interacting with a blue-tongued lizard, are designed to be accessible and engaging for all.

The commitment from the staff at both Inner West Neighbour Aid and Concord West Rhodes Pre School ensures that each gathering is meaningful and enjoyable, providing moments of curiosity, joy, and deeper understanding between participants.

Client Survey 2023

The 2023 Client Survey, conducted every two years, gathered valuable feedback from our clients to better understand their experiences and make improvements. We reached out to 367 clients and received responses from 89 individuals (24%). Key findings indicated that referrals from friends and My Aged Care are the primary sources of new clients, with 94% of respondents willing to recommend Neighbour Aid. An impressive 96% of clients feel valued, and while 54% have email addresses, only 28% prefer to receive correspondence this way. Importantly, 100% of respondents reported improvements in health and mobility since participating in Neighbour Aid's exercise programs.

The survey also highlighted clients' preferences for activities and outings. While 82% enjoy the variety of outings offered, many expressed a desire for more options, including intergenerational activities. Popular outings include visits to restaurants, gardens, and shows, with requests for more trips to parks and cultural venues. Feedback from the Living Well with Dementia and 5 Senses Garden Workshops underscored the importance of social connection and building skills.

Clients appreciated the warm and supportive atmosphere created by our staff and volunteers, with 89% satisfied with the service from the Help at Home team. Overall, the survey results highlighted our dedication to providing enriching experiences and our ongoing commitment to enhancing our services in response to client feedback. Thank you to Emma-Lee Torres Bernal for her work in developing and collating the results of the Client Survey 2023.

Systems Improvements

Neighbour Aid is a small to medium sized organisation with limited funding and resources. So streamlining any processes creates efficiencies and cost savings. This financial year Inner West Neighbour Aid invested in email software, ActiveCampaign, to assist with automating client and volunteer enquiries from our website, distribution of our quarterly newsletter via email and also email communication with large groups, such as our volunteers, donors, contractors and other contacts. Thank you to Stella Angelo, our volunteer newsletter editor and Victor Fox our IT contractor for their support and assistance with the set up and implementation of this software.

Staff

Inner West Neighbour Aid values the wellbeing of its staff and volunteers, reflected in the recent partnership with MindFit at Work, a new Employee Assistance Program (EAP) provider as of July 2023.

This year we were committed to deepening our connection to Aboriginal culture and fostering genuine respect within both our organisation and the wider community. With the guidance of Aunty Norma Ingram, we enriched our Acknowledgement of Country, ensuring it speaks more meaningfully to the Wangal people of the Eora Nation, whose land we respectfully walk on every day. We are weaving Aboriginal cultural awareness into the fabric of our team and programs, from regular discussions to the visible pride we take in displaying the Aboriginal flag at our office, engaging in NAIDOC Week celebrations, learning from Aboriginal organisations, and updating our email communication to include powerful symbols like the Aboriginal flag and Pride Progress flag. These steps are more than actions and display a commitment to inclusion and a community grounded in respect and understanding.

During the 2024 financial year we farewelled Anthony Palade and Jacque Plavsic and welcomed Mikali Anagnostis, Chantel Jurcevic and Natesha Somasundaram. Thank you to our valued and continuing staff members Stuart Blundell, Emel Jurd, Indah Kusumawati, Jake Lackner, Karen Paige, Nicholas Robinson, Josslien Sadtler, Joanne Santas, Maja Sorensen, Emma-Lee Torres Bernal and James Wohlfiel. I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to all staff for their dedication and professionalism, their honesty and integrity, and for bringing positivity to work every day. Your willingness to share ideas, listen, and show care for each other, our volunteers, and our clients is truly appreciated. A special thank you also to Chairperson, Steven Takacs-Gal, and the Inner West Neighbour Aid Board for their unwavering commitment and guidance throughout the year.

At Inner West Neighbour Aid, our strength lies in the personal connections we build through every program and interaction. At our core, we are a community, and that spirit, guides everything we do. What sets us apart is how deeply our values are embedded at every level, shaping our actions and decisions. We listen, we care, and we remain committed to ensuring that seniors are seen, heard, and valued. It is truly an honour to be part of this incredible community, and I am proud of what we have achieved together.

Chairperson's Report



Steven Takacs-Gal

As Chairperson of Inner West Neighbour Aid, I am pleased to reflect on the achievements and milestones of the past year in our 2023/2024 Annual Report. This year has seen our organisation make meaningful strides in strengthening community connections, enhancing service delivery, and upholding our vision, values and purpose. The tireless efforts of staff, volunteers and partners have enabled us to respond to the changing needs of our community with care, compassion, and resilience. As we move forward, the board and I remain committed to building on this foundation, ensuring Inner West Neighbour Aid continues to be a pillar of support, inclusion and innovation for years to come.

Aged Care Reforms

We started the financial year with some welcome news about the Aged Care Reforms. The Minister for Aged Care, the Hon Anika Wells MP announced that the amalgamation of the Commonwealth Home Support Programme (CHSP), Home Care Package Program and Short Term Restorative Care Program was further extended. This meant that CHSP providers will transition to the new Support at Home program no earlier than July 2027. This delayed timeline allows organisations like Inner West Neighbour Aid more time to

prepare for the reforms and ensure a smooth transition for operations and clients.

Readiness for the reforms have included building board governance and staff capability, reviewing systems and information technology needs. We acknowledge that there is more to do. For an organisation our size, this extension is welcome news and also indicative of the challenges and complexities of reforming the existing aged care system.

New Purpose Statement

Inner West Neighbour Aid, like many community organisations, places a high value on collaboration and teamwork. The Neighbour Aid community consists of 15 staff members, around 100 volunteers, close to 400 clients, over 13 contractors and 25 schools and community partners. Effective collaboration goes beyond strong relationships and trust. It requires everyone in our community being dedicated to a shared purpose.

The organisation's mission statement was last renewed in 2012 so this financial year, the board developed our new purpose statement in consultation with staff:

"Supporting seniors to live independently, build friendships and thrive in their local community."

We believe that our message is succinct and clear. Inner West Neighbour Aid's primary purpose is supporting seniors. The main outcomes for seniors being independence, friendships or connections and being supported with opportunities to thrive at any age.

2023 - 2025 Strategic Plan

The board has consistently monitored the 3 strategic priorities that will position Neighbour Aid for the Aged Care Reforms:

- 1. Grow and maintain the sustainability of our private Help at Home service: the board remains committed to the social enterprise model, with a view to a long term goal of establishing a separate income stream and trusted and successful brand.
- 2. Increase organisational efficiencies and improve the client and volunteer experience: New technology will catapult the organisation to an almost paperless environment, help staff reduce the level of manual effort needed and lead to more quality time to deliver better services and serve more of our community. New technology will help build the foundation for the organisation to monitor and record data for future programs and opportunities, improve the quality and safety of care and services, attract and retain our paid and unpaid workforce in an increasingly competitive labour market.
- 3. Attract and retain active seniors to grow our community that includes current and future:
 - a) Clients
 - b) Volunteers
 - c) Public participants

Currently over 70% of clients are between 80 – 99 years and almost 30% of volunteers are between 60 – 79 years. The intention is to attract new people to Neighbour Aid, as clients, volunteers and/or public participants. The outcomes of having new people join, are to increase revenue and the volunteer workforce. It is hoped that people who join Neighbour Aid at an earlier age than our current client or volunteer group, will stay with us for a long time and potentially move between volunteer and client status.

The Crucial Role of Good Governance

A great board is characterized by its alignment with the organisation's purpose and its commitment to strategic thinking. We are fortunate to have board members who deeply understand and are passionate about our purpose. Our volunteer board members meet at least once a month and work cohesively, engage actively, and foster open communication. The board has gone from strength to strength in the past 12 months and is committed to continuous improvement, regularly evaluating its own performance and seeking opportunities for growth through training and development.

It has been a privilege and pleasure working with the board this year. Each board member has shared their valuable insight, individual perspective, fresh ideas, relevant experience and strong leadership with the organisation.

2025 is going to be a year full of opportunities, growth, and exciting collaborations. I look forward to working together with the board to further the fantastic work that Inner West Neighbour Aid is already doing.

A heartfelt thank you to our wonderful staff and volunteers, whose dedication and humility shine brightly in our community. To our clients, we are grateful for the stories and life experiences you share with us. It is a genuine privilege to be part of this community alongside you.

Treasurer's Report

The annual audited accounts to 30 June 2024 are presented for consideration and adoption. A full version of the audited Financial Statements are available on request. This financial year, Inner West Neighbour Aid has reported an operating deficit of \$31,746 and total net assets of \$300,570. This is compared to 2023, where the operating deficit was \$45,360 and total net assets were \$332,316.

For an organisation of Inner West Neighbour Aid's size and reach, the operating deficit is considered acceptable and reasonable. Commonwealth Home Support Programme providers continue to face uncertainty, with transition to the new Support at Home Program announced as, no earlier than 1 July 2027. Challenges therefore exist across the sector, with budgeting, resource allocation and strategic planning. The Inner West Neighbour Aid Board has responded by developing a Strategic Plan for 2023 – 2025 to mitigate risks and remain adaptable.

Commonwealth Home Support Programme (CHSP) Funding

CHSP funding represents 84% of Inner West Neighbour Aid's total income. Payment in arrears of CHSP funding commenced in the 2022/2023 financial year whereby Inner West Neighbour Aid received the annual contracted funding amount, divided equally into 12, paid in arrears each month.

For the 2023/2024 financial year, funding receipts unexpectedly and without explanation, reverted back to upfront payments from the Department of Health and Aged Care. Funding was received as follows:

- Upfront receipt of \$547,618 in July 2023 to block fund programs for the 6 months from July 2023 to December 2023; and
- Upfront receipt of \$455,983 in November 2023 to block fund programs for the 5 months from January 2024 to May 2024.
- In arrears receipt of \$91,197 in July 2024 for the June 2024 programs.

Bank Investment Strategy

To counter any unpredictability in the timing of funding payments, the board approved the closure of a \$200,000 term deposit account with the Commonwealth Bank of Australia, to be deposited into an accessible and interest earning business account with AMP.

Income

There was a 12% increase in income from 2023 to 2024 mainly due to a:

- 70% increase in Club Grants: After a drastic decline during the 2020/2021 and 2021/2022 COVID-19 affected financial years, availability and allocation of Club Grants has risen.
- 31% increase in Client Fees: The board approved an increase in client fees from 1 July 2023. The increase in client fees helped to offset the increase in fuel prices, purchase of COVID-19 safety and hygiene supplies, increasing staff and related program expenses.
- 17% increase in Help at Home income: As a social enterprise, Help at Home continues to be challenged with rising costs, even though income increased from 2023 to 2024. The costing and pricing model of Help at Home was reviewed during this financial year and the sustainability of the program is a strategic objective of Inner West Neighbour Aid.

Expenses

There was a 10% increase in expenses from 2023 to 2024 due to a:

- 14% increase in Staff Expenses: This included an increase in staff employed on a casual basis and a board directed increase in the General Manager's working hours;
- 14% increase in Office Lease Costs: The lease for the Ashfield office commenced on 18 January 2021 for 3 years with a 3 year option to renew. Neighbour Aid exercised this option and the new lease commenced on 18 January 2024 with a termination date of 17 January 2027;
- Securing Cyber Security Insurance;
- Extraordinary Expenses, including: Agency staff covering the Finance and Administration Assistant's extended leave and purchases of an additional laptop, monitor, 2 portable air conditioning units for the office and mobile phones for staff members.

System Changes

In April 2023, Neighbour Aid expanded online payment options by setting up 3 Smart Mini Readers from Commonwealth Bank in addition to an office based EFTPOS machine. The roaming Mini Readers have reduced administration time, streamlined payments by reducing cash handling and supported a cashless business environment. For the 2023/2024 financial year approximately 80% of clients are utilising these readers to pay program fees. Although this system has associated monthly fees and occasional technology failures, the benefits have outweighed the drawbacks and it has improved the payment experience for clients.

Risk Sub-Committee

At the February 2024 board meeting, the board agreed to establish a Risk Sub-Committee in order to strengthen the board's governance responsibilities and risk review cycle. The inaugural Risk Sub-Committee meeting was convened on 29 May 2024, with myself, Peter Malhotra being appointed as Chair, joined by board members Samantha Guthleben and Tina Higgins and General Manager Allison Yee-Brogan. Achievements of the Risk Sub-Committee included the development of a Charter which was approved by the board, revision of the organisation's risk categories, risk scores and updating of the Risk Register.

I am pleased to deliver the Treasurer's Report for 2023/2024 and would like to thank our auditors, MNSA Pty Ltd, who have worked with Neighbour Aid for over 12 years. We appreciate their professional auditing services and commitment to the community.

Thank you also to Indah Kusumawati, Finance and Administration Assistant for her exceptional work on the financial report.

This is my first year serving on the Neighbour Aid Board, and I am deeply grateful for the support of my fellow board members, who have shown outstanding dedication to the values and purpose of our organisation. It has been a privilege to work alongside, collaborate with, and learn from such a talented and remarkable group of individuals.
